In the present scenario of higher education in Europe, but also worldwide, cultural and social anthropology is spread in multiple and differentiated curricula. It appears in the curricula of physicians, sociologists, psychologists, teachers, philosophers, historians, archaeologists, nurses, social workers, architects, engineers, archivists, urban planners, librarians, religious ministers, politics, policy analysts, journalists, cultural managers, interpreters and many other. The education of "hard professions" or "soft professions" seems at different levels (bachelors, master and doctorate, and permanent education) to integrate the knowledge gathered from anthropological tradition, in relation to distinct national academic systems (as workload, credits, etc.).

This sort of "Anthropology at large" happens at the same time that anthropological departments shrink or are suppressed in accord to different social and political national contexts, and that several anthropological categories and "methods" (such as "culture" and "ethnography") have been caught and re-contextualized in different disciplinary fields (maybe a form of epistemological "diffusionism").

We believe that the anthropological teaching practice in such different educational and professional programs is a central node today where we can seize again and anew the novelty of the epistemological pertinence, the public legitimacy and the social and institutional mandate of our way of knowing.

We encourage papers that within the framework of both the political and economic forces that mould today's education in public universities and the globalizing market of knowledge and jobs, focus on the role of anthropology in these curricula exploring the relationship between anthropological research and teaching.
